April 29: Absentee ballot applications must be received by your board of elections by 8:30 p.m.

MAY

May 5: Mailed absentee ballots must be postmarked by this date.

May 6: Primary/Special Election: Polls are open from 6:30 a.m. - 7:30 p.m.

May 6: Absentee Ballots may be returned by mail or personally delivered to your county board of elections. If not returned by mail, absentee ballots must be received by your board of elections by 7:30 p.m.

May 10: Last day for boards of elections to receive non-UOCAVA absentee ballots (returned by U.S. mail) that have been postmarked on or before May 5. UOCAVA absentee ballots must be received (by mail) by boards of elections by this date to be counted.

VOTER IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS / TYPES OF VALID ID

There are several types of valid photo identification.

- Ohio driver's license;
- State of Ohio ID card;
- Interim ID form issued by the Ohio BMV;
- A US passport;
- A US passport card;
- US military ID card;
- Ohio National Guard ID card; or
- US Department of Veterans Affairs ID card

All photo IDs must have the following:

- An expiration date that has not passed;
- A photograph of the voter;
- The voter's name, which must substantially conform to the voter's name as it appears in the Poll List or in the Poll Book

NOTICE: An unexpired Ohio Driver License, State ID Card, or Interim Documentation with your **former address IS an ACCEPTABLE** form of ID when your current address is in the pollbook.

The BMV issues Ohio Interim Documentation until the applicant receives their new ID through the mail. A driver's license or state identification card in the old or new format, the Ohio Interim Documentation, and a voter's old, hole-punched driver's license or state ID card are acceptable forms of identification for voting, as long as the expiration date has not passed.

If the voter changed their name and provides proof of the legal name change, completes and signs Form 10-L, and is registered within the precinct, the voter's name on the photo ID may be different from the voter's reported change of name.

REMEMBER: A voter who moves within the precinct (and completes a Voter Registration Form) or provides proof of legal name change (and completes Form 10-L) votes a regular ballot.

WHERE TO OBTAIN A FREE ID?

Ohioans who are 17 years and older can receive a state ID card at no cost from the BMV.

UNACCEPTABLE TYPES OF ID

Ohio law prohibits acceptance of the following forms of ID:

- Utility bill;
- Bank statement;
- Government check;
- Paycheck;
- Other government document (other than acceptable forms listed above) such as a social security card or birth certificate;
- Driver's license or photo identification card issued by a state other than Ohio;
- A driver's license or ID that contains a "Non-Renewable/Non-Transferable" identifier;
- A driver's license or ID that contains a "Noncitizen" identifier may be used **in conjunction with additional proof of citizenship.**

- Ohio Mobile ID
- Insurance card; or
- Any registration acknowledgment notice from the county board of elections.

PROVISIONAL BALLOTS

If you do not have any of the above forms of identification, you may cast a provisional ballot.

If you do not provide one of the above forms of photo ID, you will still be able to vote using a provisional ballot. However, for that ballot to be counted, you must return to the board of elections no later than four days following Election Day to provide a qualifying form of identification. If you do not have a photo ID because of a religious objection to

being photographed, you may complete an affidavit of religious objection and have your provisional ballot count. [Follow this link for more information on provisional ballots.](#)

ABSENTEE VOTING

Please note: all PDF forms and documents function optimally when downloaded to your computer and opened with the [free Adobe Acrobat Reader software\(opens in a new window\)](#).

* INFORMATION NEEDED TO REQUEST AN ABSENTEE BALLOT

You must use the application form prescribed by the Secretary of State ([Form 11-A](#)) or provided to you by your county board of elections to apply for your absentee ballot.

Send your request to your county board of elections. Board mailing addresses are available at [OhioSoS.gov/boards](#).

ABSENTEE VOTING BY MAIL

All Ohio voters whose registration information is up-to-date have the opportunity to vote in any election from the convenience of their own homes by requesting an absentee ballot. Absentee voting has many benefits -- You can vote early, it is convenient, it reduces the chance of lines at the polls on Election Day, and **absentee ballots are the first votes counted on Election Night**. Voters need only fill out and return an application and their absentee ballot will be mailed to them so they may make their selections at their leisure and return their ballot to the board of elections ahead of Election Day.

The deadline to request an absentee ballot is seven days before the election in which you want to vote. If mailed, absentee ballots must be postmarked by the day before the election in order to be counted. You can also return your absentee ballot in person to your [county board of elections](#) before the close of the polls at 7:30 p.m. on Election Day.

You can request your ballot for each individual election beginning on January 1 or 90 days before the date of an election, whichever is earlier, but you must complete and submit a separate application for each election in which you want to vote. Your request must be received by your local county board of elections by the close of business on the seventh day before the election. However, you should submit your request as far in advance of the election as possible to ensure there is sufficient time for the board to mail you a ballot and for you to timely return that ballot.

STEPS TO REQUEST AND VOTE AN ABSENTEE BALLOT:

1. [Complete the absentee ballot request form*](#).
2. Once you have completed your application by providing all of the required information **print and sign it**.
3. **Mail the request form back to your own county board of elections. Board mailing addresses are available at [OhioSoS.gov/boards](https://ohio.sos.gov/boards).**
4. **Wait to receive your ballot in the mail from your county board of elections.** If you have questions about your absentee ballot request, you should call your [county board of elections](#) or you can track the status of your ballot request as well as your voted absentee ballot through the [Voter Toolkit](#).
5. **Return your voted ballot.**
 - If you return your absentee ballot by mail, it must be postmarked no later than the day before Election Day and received by your county board of elections no later than four days after the election. By state law, a postmark does not include a date marked by a postage evidence system such as a postage meter. The U.S. Postal Service (USPS) estimates that it may take two to five days for your voted absentee ballot to be delivered to your board of elections by mail.
 - If you are returning your voted ballot by mail during the week before Election Day, you should take it to USPS no later than the day before Election Day and ensure it receives a postmark as follows:
 - If you use a postage label purchased at a USPS customer service window or vending machine, the date on the label is the postmark. This is the USPS-recommended way to postmark your ballot.
 - If you use postage stamps, ask that it be postmarked.

You should not use a postage meter or an online service (such as stamps.com) to affix postage. It is your responsibility to make sure the ballot has enough postage.

- If you are returning your absentee ballot in person to your board of elections, you must do so by 7:30 p.m. on Election Day. Only you, your spouse, child, or a near relative* may deliver your ballot to the board of elections for you.
- A disabled voter may select any person of their choosing to deliver their ballot, other than their employer or an officer in their union.
- The person delivering the ballot for a family member or disabled voter must complete an attestation form at the county board of elections office ([Form 12-P](#))([opens in a new window](#)).

- If you are a member of the uniformed services or a voter outside of the United States, ballots must be received by the fourth day after the election. Sign your identification envelope by the close of polls on Election Day or return in person by 7:30 p.m. on Election Day.

**Near relative includes the voter's spouse or the voter's father, mother, father-in-law, mother-in-law, grandfather, grandmother, brother, or sister of the whole or half blood, or the son, daughter, adopting parent, adopted child, stepparent, stepchild, uncle, aunt, nephew, or niece.*

If you do not vote your absentee ballot and instead decide to go to your assigned polling place on Election Day, you must vote a provisional ballot.

Note: No voted ballot may be returned to a board of elections by fax or e-mail. If a voted ballot is returned by fax or e-mail, it will not be accepted, processed, or counted.

MILITARY AND OVERSEAS VOTERS

Note: State and federal law make additional accommodations for military and overseas voters. Please visit MilitaryVotes.Ohio.gov for more information

HOSPITALIZED VOTERS

If you or your minor child is in the hospital on Election Day, you must submit a properly-completed and signed request to the board of elections of the county in which your voting residence is located by 3 p.m. on Election Day. To be eligible under this provision, you or your minor child must be confined in a hospital because of an accident or unforeseeable medical emergency. If you or your minor child is hospitalized in the same county where you are registered to vote, two representatives of the board of elections can deliver the ballot to you, wait while you mark the ballot, and return your voted ballot to the board office. Additionally, you may include in your absentee ballot application a request that your county board of elections give your unmarked ballot to a designated relative – your spouse, father, mother, father-in-law, mother-in-law, grandfather, grandmother, brother, sister, son, daughter, adopted parent, adopted child, stepparent, stepchild, uncle, aunt, nephew or niece – who shall deliver the ballot to you in the hospital and return your voted ballot to the board office. VOTERS WITH DISABILITIES

ISSUE 2 PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

TO FUND PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS BY
PERMITTING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

Proposed by Joint Resolution of the General Assembly
To enact Section 2t of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Ohio

A majority yes vote is required for the adoption of Section 2t.

This proposed amendment would:

1. Authorize the state to issue bonds or other obligations to finance or assist in financing public infrastructure capital improvements for local governments and other governmental entities. Capital improvement projects would be limited to roads and bridges, waste water treatment systems, water supply systems, solid waste disposal facilities, storm water and sanitary collection, storage, and treatment facilities.
2. Determine that such capital improvements are necessary to preserve and expand the public infrastructure, ensure public health, safety and welfare, create and preserve jobs, enhance employment opportunities, and improve the economic welfare of the people of Ohio.
3. Limit the total principal amount of the state general obligations issued under the amendment to no more than \$2.5 billion over a ten-year period. Any principal amount that could have been issued in any prior fiscal year, but was not issued, may subsequently be issued.
4. Require that obligations issued under this amendment mature no later than thirty (30) years after their date of issuance, and that any obligation issued to retire or refund other obligations mature no later than the permitted maturity date for the obligations being retired or refunded.
5. Authorize the General Assembly to pass laws implementing this amendment, including laws establishing procedures for incurring and

issuing obligations, and laws providing for the use of Ohio products, materials, services and labor to the extent possible.

If approved, the amendment shall take effect immediately.

A "YES" vote means approval of the amendment.

A "NO" vote means disapproval of the amendment.

State Issue 2 - EXPLANATION

Proposed Constitutional Amendment

**TO FUND PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS BY
PERMITTING**

THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

Proposed by Joint Resolution of the General Assembly

To enact Section 2t of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Ohio
The purpose of this amendment is to ensure public health, safety, and welfare, create and preserve jobs, enhance employment opportunities, and improve the economic welfare of the people of Ohio by improving public infrastructure.

The amendment authorizes the State of Ohio to issue general obligation bonds to pay for or help local governments pay for public infrastructure capital improvements. Projects would be limited to roads and bridges, wastewater treatment systems, water supply systems, solid waste disposal facilities, and storm water and sanitary collection, storage, and treatment facilities, including real property or interests in real property, facilities and equipment related or incidental thereto, and the cost of acquisition, construction, reconstruction, expansion, improvement, planning and equipping.

The Ohio Constitution currently contains a provision authorizing the State of Ohio to issue bonds to finance public infrastructure capital improvements for local governments through the State Capital Improvements Program. The proposed amendment limits bond issuance to \$2.5 billion over a ten-year period, with no more than \$250 million in each of the first ten fiscal years. Any principal amount that could have been issued in a prior fiscal year, but was not issued, may subsequently be issued. No general obligations for public infrastructure capital improvements may be issued

under this amendment until the existing authority to issue state infrastructure bonds under Article VIII, Section 2s of the Ohio Constitution has been exhausted. These general obligations must mature no later than thirty (30) years after their date of issuance, and any refunding obligations must mature no later than the permitted maturity date for the obligations being refunded.

This amendment also authorizes the General Assembly to pass laws providing for its implementation. The laws must establish a procedure for incurring and issuing obligations and provide for the use of Ohio products, materials, services, and labor to the extent possible in any project financed, in whole or in part, under the section.

If approved, the amendment would take effect immediately.

As certified in Columbus, Ohio on the 12th day of February by the secretary of the Ohio Ballot Board to the Secretary of State of Ohio as the explanation prescribed by the Ohio Ballot Board, acting pursuant to Article XVI, Section 1 of the Ohio Constitution and section 3506.062 of the Revised Code of Ohio, of this constitutional amendment proposed by the General Assembly for submission to the Ohio electorate to be held on May 6, 2025.

STATE ISSUE 2 - ARGUMENT FOR

Approving Issue 2 will continue the State Capital Improvements Program, which has existed since 1987, and help support the completion of critically important road, bridge, sewer, and other infrastructure projects in local communities, with zero increase in taxes.

- Issue 2 brings needed repairs. To keep us safe and to maintain our quality of life, local communities need help to fix deteriorating roads, bridges, and other facilities. Issue 2 renews a 38-year highly successful program to help local governments with these vital improvements.
- Issue 2 is a tried-and-true success for Ohio. First authorized in 1987, voters have renewed it three times—1995, 2005, and 2014.
- All 88 counties benefit, and thousands of jobs are created. Every Ohio county has benefited from this program, which has produced more than 19,000 grants and loans for essential, locally selected projects. Issue 2 will help thousands more projects be completed that wouldn't be otherwise and

support tens of thousands of jobs throughout Ohio. An objective grant allocation process assures fairness so that communities both large and small receive funding.

□ Zero increase in taxes. Funds to repay project bonds are already built into state budget planning, so Issue 2 won't increase your taxes. And Ohio's strong finances and excellent bond ratings make possible a modest increase in funding for these capital improvements. Issue 2 also reduces pressure to raise local taxes.

□ Bipartisan support. Issue 2 is strongly backed by Democrats and Republicans, local government groups representing counties, townships, and cities, and Ohio businesses and professional associations. The Senate (30-1) and House (87-4) overwhelmingly voted to place the program's continued existence on the ballot this May.

Issue 2 is a proven, affordable program that's good for our local communities. Help build a stronger Ohio and create jobs by voting YES.

STATE ISSUE 2 - ARGUMENT AGAINST

Issue 2 allows the state to issue more general obligation bonds, increasing indebtedness to pay for public infrastructure capital improvements. As a result, all Ohio taxpayers will be paying interest on those bonds to cover local government projects including roads, bridges, waste water treatment systems, water supply systems, solid waste disposal facilities and storm water and sanitary collection, storage and treatment facilities. These are community-based projects from which many Ohioans may not see a direct benefit and which local governments should prioritize and pay for using locally-raised dollars.

The state government has gone back to voters numerous times for permission to issue more general obligation bonds, most recently in 2014. Issue 2 represents an increase in the amount of borrowed money and spending on local infrastructure as compared to previous years, now totaling 2.5 billion dollars.

Though the newly issued bonds will pay for projects over the next decade, it may take up to three times that long to pay them back as outlined in the

full text of House Joint Resolution 8, which placed Issue 2 on the ballot: "Each issue of obligations issued under this section shall mature in not more than thirty years from the date of issuance, or, if issued to retire or refund other obligations, within that number of years from the date the debt being retired or refunded was originally issued."

Proposed Replacement of Income Tax Tiffin City

A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage

Shall ordinance 2025-5 providing for the continuation of an existing 1/4% levy on income for a continuing period of time effective January 1, 2026 to provide funds to be used for the purpose of paying (a) costs, excluding wages, salaries and benefits of city officers and employees, of (i) maintaining, repairing and improving public streets by constructing, reconstructing and rehabilitating the pavement base, bridges, curbs, drainage improvements, driveway approaches and pedestrian ramps, preparing the surface and surfacing and resurfacing, and installing traffic signals and signalization and (ii) acquiring equipment required for such maintenance, repair and improvements, and (b) debt service charges on notes or bonds of the city issued for those purposes, (which levy shall be in addition to the city's 1-3/4% levy on income that is in effect for a continuing period of time) be passed?

The League of Women Voters of the Tiffin Area ranks as a High Priority the maintenance of city streets and supports, as a method of funding, income tax for financing this service.

A vote 'yes' for road and bridge levy

The following should also be considered:

- This is not a tax increase, but a continuation of the existing 0.25% income tax used for the construction, repair, and maintenance of roads, bridges, and culverts in the city of Tiffin
- The levy has generated more than \$8.4 million helped the city secure \$7.7 million in state and federal grants
- \$6.5 million has used for street resurfacing since 2019 — compared to only \$300,000–\$400,000 annually before the levy
- The city is on track for a sustainable 15–20-year paving cycle
- Major projects were completed without long-term debt

A vote 'no' for road and bridge levy

The following should also be considered:

- Delays infrastructure upgrades, possibly increasing costs
- There is no organized opposition to this levy

**LEAGUE OF
WOMEN VOTERS®**

The mission of the League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan political organization, is to encourage the informed and active participation of citizens in government and to influence public policy through education and advocacy.

In 1920, just six months before the U.S. Constitution was amended to give women the right to vote, the National American Woman Suffrage Association's President, Carrie Chapman Catt, proposed the creation of the League of Women Voters. The League's first purpose was to teach women how to exercise their new right to vote. Thus, the League was to "finish the fight" that the suffragists had started. For over 100 years the League has continued to serve all citizens and has opened its membership to any citizen of voting age, male or female. Today, the League of Women Voters is a three-tier organization, including Leagues at the local, state, and national levels. A member joining any of the 29 local Leagues in Ohio is automatically a member of the Ohio and the U.S. Leagues.

The Tiffin League was established in 1970 after a group of women who had been members in other communities moved to town and realized there was no League. The first two years were spent learning

about our community, the political process at the city, county, state, and national levels.



As a citizen education organization, the League registers voters, provides unbiased information on candidates and issues, sponsors debates and candidates' nights, and produces informational publications on critical public policy issues. Educational publications published by the League are on such topics as Ohio government, Ohio government finances, writing your government representatives, Ohio's open meetings law, and education finance in the state. Today membership is open to men and women 18 years of age and older.

As a multi-issue organization, there is a wide variety of critical areas in which the League concentrates its efforts through education and advocacy. The League of Women Voters takes political action on issues on which member agreement has been reached. The Ohio League currently has positions on the Ohio constitution, apportionment/districting, state government finances, children's services, primary and secondary education, juvenile justice, and natural resources. The Tiffin League has positions on City Charter, City Services, Parks and Recreation, County Finances/Services, Housing in Tiffin, Local Education Funding, Local Election Reform, Local Health Care Services, Behavioral Health Services, and Recycling.

NONPARTISANSHIP:

The League of Women Voters is nonpartisan - it neither supports nor opposes any political party or candidate. The League may take political action on issues on which member agreement has been reached. Members, as individuals, are encouraged to participate fully in the political process.
